# WhatsApp - What Parents and Carers Need to Know – National Online Safety

The experts at National Online Safety have produced a very informative guide for parents and carers to help them understand the potential online dangers of WhatsApp - WhatsApp - What Parents and Carers Need to Know.

These mainly stem from what others post on a WhatsApp thread and the ability of being added to groups by others



without your child's consent, resulting in them potentially being exposed to inappropriate material. It is also worth noting that WhatsApp is listed in the UK and Europe with an age restriction of 16+. A number of students have recently been added to one of these inappropriate WhatsApp groups, with more than 700 members, without their consent.

Please can we ask parents and carers to have open conversations with their children to ensure that their child feels confident to speak to you if they are inadvertently exposed to material online that upsets them – another National Online Safety publication deals with <u>Supporting Children to Deal with Upsetting Content</u>.


### **Did You Know?**

# Sparx Reader

This year students in Years 7 and 8 are utilising the Sparx Reader platform online as part of their English homework - set every fortnight (Week A). After a short reading test, the programme recommends a number of books for



cores in the 90th percentile Scores in the

students to choose to read from the platform. Students then just pick one and away they go; they can access their books on any device, even phones. Sparx tracks what students are reading and how much effort they put into their reading, not the actual number of books they read, and award them Sparx Reader Points (SRP) as they read. After each section, students answer a number of questions to check their comprehension of what they have read and earn more Reader Points. Each fortnight, Year 7 and Year 8 students are expected to earn at least 600 points (equivalent to 60 minutes of reading) and we hope that they will be clocking-up many more than this minimum – Each term there will be a trophy for the student who puts in the MOST effort and earns the most SRP points. In addition, every student is working towards a Gold Reader Pass.

We already have some fabulous students who have already achieved Gold Reader status - well done to Joshua, Arthur, Karina, Anais and Rumer in Year 7 and Maggie in Year 8.


