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### Sixth Form Scientists Explore Biology in Action

This week a number of our Year 12 Biologists had an insight into the world of bio-tech – a relatively new technology using nature to control nature. The group spent the morning at Bioline, the UK branch of a multinational organisation, based right on their doorstep in Little Clacton. The company is a global organisation that breeds insects that are used in pest control in place of pesticides, primarily for market garden growers of fruit and vegetables across Europe and the USA, but also for producers of ornamental plants and flowers. The aphids and mites that they breed eat or kill the pests that feed on plants, such as green-fly and black-fly, and therefore eradicate the pest within the hot-houses where they are released. The students were given a tour of the facilities and given a full explanation of the breeding process before the eggs, that the breeding aphids and mites lay, are packed and shipped to growers who are using the technology as effective pest control. Research and Quality Control Bio-engineers were on hand to explain how their technology works and showed the students samples of live mites and aphids use as natural test control. The students were amazed at how the theory that they have





been learning in class is actually utilised in the real world; some are even contemplating joining their season workforce in the summer, when they have a colossal demand for their biotech insects, during the peak growing season. ### Using your actions and words with care

What you do, say and share online can have a big impact on the way other people feel, as well as how others perceive you. When emotions are high, take a moment to reflect and continue when you're feeling calmer.

### **Building healthy relationships**

Listen to and support your friends both online and offline by respecting their boundaries and treating them with kindness.

Look out for signs of an unhealthy relationship - if someone is pressuring you, is dishonest, or makes you feel uncomfortable, know that you can always talk to an adult or friend you trust.

### Being an upstander when you see bullying, harassment or hate.

By using reporting tools or speaking out if you feel able to do so, you can offer support to the victims of these behaviours. This can help people to feel less alone and can encourage them to seek further assistance if they need it. Keeping a look out for suspicious information and people online.

### Knowing it's never too late to talk to an adult about something you're experiencing online.

Even if you're worried it might be uncomfortable, or you think you've done something wrong, speaking to someone is the first step in getting support and moving forward.
