## *'Learning on Location' - Human Geography at the Olympic Park*

Recently, our Year 10 Geography students attended one of their field work excursions; a compulsory element of their GCSE exam course. The focus of the day was to investigate the regeneration of London's Olympic Park situated in the Borough of Newham, identified as one of the most deprived local authorities in the country. In the latter part of the last century, the area was one of the busiest industrial hubs in the world, but as global competition, increased it fell into decline. The regeneration of the area began in the years leading up to the London 2012 Olympics and eleven years later, the legacy continues, by still bringing growth to the area. Throughout the day, students undertook a number of surveys at a variety



of sites around the park, including; a housing estate outside the main area of regeneration, the former Olympic Village where the athletes lived during the games (and since converted to housing); and, an area next to the West Ham Stadium and Westfield Shopping centre, now a hub for entertainment and night-time culture. Students noticed the density of business people and how busy it was everywhere. They investigated the up-keep required to maintain the appearance of each area and looked at the visible security measures in place to ensure the safety of visitors to all areas of the park.

## Duke of Edinburgh Award – Putting their Map Reading Skills to the Test

As part of our Year 9 Broader Curriculum offer, a number of students are working towards their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award. Having already completed two practice hikes, the sixty students recently undertook their final practice around Great Oakley, Ramsey and Harwich. Having spent a number of weeks planning their route, and

practicing their navigation techniques, they embarked on a five-hour hike, ahead of their final assessment at the



end of June. Divided into fourteen groups, the students set-off from points in Great Oakley and Stour Woods in Wrabness. Hiking through woods and across fields, following designated footpaths, they made their way along their pre-planned routes towards the finish on Dovercourt seafront. Their outing also included an hour-long stop with a challenge to cook a



hot lunch, working as a team within their groups. Prior to starting out, each team had decided on their menu and packed the necessary ingredients, along with camping stoves and cooking pans, to enable them to cook

their dishes. The menus were varied, although pasta seemed to be the dish of choice, some opting for spaghetti, fusilli or similar with a sauce, whilst others opted for 'just-add-water' instant noodle meals or hot dog sausages in rolls. Many of the groups spent their day almost entirely on sections of the Essex Way, whilst others, who should have been on the Essex Way, discovered that navigational errors had led to them walking around in circles! After correcting their errors, they all eventually made it to the finish rendezvous, all be it a little later than originally planned, highlighting that they need to actually hike rather than just wander! All of the groups had a fantastic day in the spring sunshine and were glad that the rain stayed away.
